It has also been heartwarming to see how many residents have been offering support to other residents when required. Many still continue to wear masks and people have different comfort levels but it seems to be working out.

The Board would like to thank all committee members who seemed to have maintained their enthusiasm and all residents who contribute in their own way to making 50 Quebec a very special place.

There is no way to adequately express how much we appreciate the contributions made by our property manager and staff. The already complex job of property manager became infinitely more complex during COVID-19, but Karolina was able to handle all the challenges with skill, competence and understanding. Carlos and Violeta continued to maintain the building with professionalism and pride. All three of our staff demonstrated a high degree of adaptability, resourcefulness and

sensitivity in dealing with situations many of which were new and required unique solutions.

Message from Management and Staff

The sun is out encouraging the flowers to bloom. 50 Quebec is returning to its glorious existence.

Our building is also due to several latest updates. Over the past several years we have slowly replaced our lighting fixtures to operate on energy saving LED

formats. We are now in the process of modernizing the brown post lights that illuminate the front of the building along Quebec Ave.

New Chiller and Cooling Tower

The building's chiller (air conditioning) has come to the end of its useful life. It requires replacing and, with the help of our engineers, a new unit was purchased and is in the process of installation to meet our end of May deadline. The unit, if I can use a common phrase, is "state of the art." Magnetic bearings produce minimal vibration. Improved performance reduces lower maintenance costs. In the fall electronic control features will be installed to allow remote monitoring. To meet our our May deadline, the unit will require a delay in installing the more advanced features in the unit.

[Note: Labour Union actions in the construction industry may cause a delay in the installation. The Management Office will keep you informed]

An exciting adventure awaits! The water and condenser equipment are located on the roof of the building. These units cannot fit in the elevators. So, the contractor has arranged for a heavy-duty crane to remove the old equipment and to raise the new unit to the roof. This will be an all-day event with the crane located on Quebec Avenue. Little kids and other curious bystanders will have a front row seat to the activities. The size of the lifting equipment will resemble this picture.



Hallway Refurbishment Project

This is an exciting project. The board has narrowed it down to two designers. Once the designer is chosen, the project can start. Numerous meetings and details will go

into the design phase before two selected options can be presented to the owners for a vote.

HPGR Tennis Court and Swimming Pool

The swimming pool mechanical room is being waterproofed which should mitigate some of the water penetration seen in the P1 ceiling, The pool opening date of June 4th still stands; any delays will be communicated to all residents. The tennis court needs further evaluation by the engineer and bore hole drilling to establish a repair plan.

Building Maintenance

Our wonderful building is now over forty years old. Behind the scenes, the Board and Property Manager do reviews of the structure and have implemented programs to avoid any major problems. Most of this work is carried out without interruptions to the residents.

There are, however, maintenance requirements that might have a minor influence on your enjoyment of your unit. An example is the recent completion of the fan coil review. During the months of May and June certain activities are planned that might cause a slight disruption on your plans. These are:

- Carpet Cleaning – May 17
- Garage Cleaning – May 25
- Garage Drains and Basins – May 24 and
- Compactor Chute clean – June 1

As always, your patience and understanding are very much appreciated.



Landscape and Gardening Committee

An unusually cold April has resulted in a later arrival of the spring bulbs and delayed growth of our perennials and shrubs. Nonetheless, the planned

transplanting as well as purchasing new stock for our gardens has carried on. While still early we are not anticipating any supply issues this year.

Some of the shrubs along the north edge of the property had a parasite and have already been removed. In their place will be yews which are hardy and shade tolerant. Likewise, some shrubs that have been damaged by winter will be replaced with species that are more tolerant of these conditions.

Sadly, our gardens continue to be vulnerable to life in the big city and the thoughtlessness of strangers and some of our neighbours. The garden beds have experienced deliberate vandalism as well as abuse from dogs and dog owners on a regular basis. Signage alone does not seem to be enough of an education or a deterrent. Rather than replanting the perennial and annual beds that have been devastated, we will undertake a planting of shrubs that hopefully will be more unwelcoming to trespassers and dogs. To this end, thorny barberry bushes will be installed near the side where Quebec meets Gothic. This area is particularly attractive to dog owners and their dogs. Our property already has a number of these shrubs dotting the landscape, so their addition will continue to complement the existing landscape while, hopefully, inhibit the casual and daily abuse this area experiences.



In the coming weeks we can all look forward to the blooming of our flowering shrubs, the budding out of the perennials, and the arrival and planting of our annuals. The addition of various Allium bulbs planted in the fall should put on a dramatic display of blue and pink late in the spring. At our entrance the burgundy-coloured Japanese Maples will be complemented this year with the addition of the delicate, chartreuse-coloured Hakone grass to produce a dazzling yet harmonious colour combination. You will see larger masses of colour this year as we have

amalgamated some stray specimens. Likewise, the entrance by the parking garage will be tidied up with a structured planting of heat tolerant junipers.

Thank you to everyone who stops to pull out a weed or pick up a piece of trash that has blown on to the property.
