President's Update ~

Greetings from the Board of Directors

Windows Replacement Project:

Good news, we are ready to move forward on the next phase of the Windows Replacement. AWD (Aluminum Window Designs) will begin work on the corner windows on <u>April 15th</u>, 2019. Following are some more details:

- Work will begin on the **North side** with units 08 followed by 07;
- AWD plans to complete one (1) unit per day (both sides of living room windows);
- All work will be done from the inside of your unit (sufficient access needs to be provided);
- A **briefing session** with full instructions will be held by management and AWD prior to the start date of April 15th;
- Upon completion of work on the North side, work on the <u>South side</u> will begin with units 01 followed by 02;
- One of the elevators will be dedicated *On Service* for the transportation of the construction material from April to September between 7:00 am 3:00 pm;
- There will be a Security guard stationed outside the unit while work on the windows is going on;
- The board has retained independent engineering firm R and C Engineering Inc. to consult, monitor and report on all work done on the windows replacement for the above phase.

Other good news is the replacement of the garage lights with LED will take place in the next week or two. We are also seeking volunteer(s) – as you will read below – to continue our wonderful newsletter **VIEWPOINT 50**. Noise Issues ~

We have recently been receiving more frequent noise complaints, so we would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that it is important that you be aware of and conscientious of the fact that your neighbours are close by. Here are some basic reminders and tips:

- If you have hard surface flooring, area rugs are still needed in high traffic areas to minimize noise transfer to the units below and beside you.
- Don't wear your hard soled shoes in the condo.
- Put felt pads on the bottom of all of your chair legs, tables or any furniture which might move around so your neighbours don't have to hear a scraping noise every time you pull out a chair.
- Keep the volume of your TVs, stereos, and gaming systems to a reasonable level, away from the walls, and minimize the bass level. Use headphones if you like your music or TV really loud.
- Try not to slam cupboard doors, and replace or install rubber stoppers on doors if they are missing.

• If you are having friends over and/or are cheering (or booing) for your team, remember to keep your voices to a reasonable level and don't let the party move into the corridor.

Energy & Recycling Committee ~

Energy and Recycling Committee members have been busy all year helping residents redirect much of their unwanted household items to others in need, instead of adding to our garbage disposal costs. If you have unwanted items and are unsure as to the best, and most effective, way to pass them along to others, feel free to contact any member of the committee for advice and practical assistance.

Use of the Blue and Green Bins has increased this past year. However, we can and need to do more. The City of Toronto has raised the cost of garbage pickup/disposal significantly and this cost is reflected in our monthly maintenance fees. To help reduce our costs, it is important that only clean, well rinsed food

containers be placed in the blue bins. The City requires that items for recycling must not be bagged in black, green, opaque or grocery bags. If you need to use a bag it must be a clear plastic bag.

Brown liquor store bags are acceptable for use in the blue bin program. BLACK PLASTIC items are not acceptable in Blue Bins because the City of Toronto does not recycle them. In order to change this, perhaps each of us could express our concerns directly to the City via the 311 call centre.

Thank you for your ongoing cooperation.

Landscape Committee ~

The Landscape Committee has been working with our gardener, Wayne, over the past few weeks, and together we have planned the following proposed highlights for our gardens for 2019.

Perennials will be planted to add more colour, particularly along the "Gothic Garden" side. The Quebec/Gothic area will have a new garden design plan. It will include new mass plantings of shrubs and perennials that will complement other existing plants in the current gardens. In order to reduce the look of the large area of green, the current euonymus groundcover will be pushed back close to another two metres, if possible. This will make more room to add new perennials, in particular to create a new design yet to be finalized by the Committee and board of directors.

The planters at the front of the building were changed last season for more uniform and formal appearance with new Japanese Maple trees, boxwood border hedge and perennials. This year, some annuals will be added for uniform summer colour.

Now that the construction on Quebec is less intense, the gardens along Quebec Avenue will be full of colour!

The gardens along the west side of the building are doing very well and will be maintained. There will be continued pruning of the bushes around the pool and the hillside.

The Committee is most appreciative of and thankful for the hard work the weeding volunteers perform. A continued effort will be made to reduce and control the weeds.
