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SEAN CUMMING



In case you know him by sight but not by name, let us introduce Sean Cumming. Our neighbour Sean has lived at 50 Quebec since 1994, first as a tenant and then as an owner. But the association goes back further than that: Sean was actually born within sight of our building!

Sean's father was a journalist with Canadian Press, so long-term assignments meant that his family moved around. Sean went to public schools in New Jersey, Toronto, and Ottawa. He started his higher education at Carleton University (history), then switched to the University of Ottawa (law). After obtaining his law degree, Sean practiced with law firms in Ottawa from 1981-1992. Seeking higher education, he attended the London School of Economics in 1992-1993 and obtained his Master of Law degree.

Sean then did what students long to do; after attending the LSE he took advantage of being in Europe to do a little travelling. Returning to Canada in 1994, Sean settled down to practice law with a firm in Toronto, before setting out on his own in 1998. He soon built up a successful solo practice in both Ottawa and Toronto through referrals from other law firms and personal reputation.

In talking to Sean, though, you don't get nearly as many law stories as you do military ones (and he's a wonderful story-teller). He started out in the Army Reserves in the 1970s, and ended up retiring from the Royal Canadian Artillery with the rank of Master Warrant Officer. Still unwilling to leave the military, he signed on to the Supplementary Reserves until his final retirement.

As a Battery Sergeant Major in the Artillery, Sean was responsible for up to 100 personnel at any given time. He has fond memories of times spent at various military bases from Halifax NS to Chilliwack BC to Frobisher Bay NU, as well as overseas in Germany. When he joined the military, women were not allowed in Artillery, but he has since trained men and woman together, including ones who ended up in Afghanistan.

Sean says that the Artillery is a great way to blow off steam after practicing law! Alternatively, when he's off the base and out of the courts, Sean enjoys swimming, bicycling, and playing bridge, which he learned from his grandfather, The Colonel (yes, he's from a military family). Little known fact: Sean has been a vegetarian since the 1960s.

ALANNAH





CIARAN



Some of you may remember Ciaran from last summer, when he started supervising our pool, although he actually has three years' worth of experience as a lifeguard. With a National Lifeguards certificate, which includes first aid and CPR training, Ciaran keeps a watchful eye on beginners and experienced swimmers alike who enjoy the pool and camaraderie of the deck. While he has never had to rescue anyone here, he has saved swimmers in other pools. Perhaps that's one reason why he is mulling over initiating a "survival swimming" course, which is only in the let's-think-about-it stage but sounds like a great idea to us.

Ciaran hails from Toronto and attends Queens University in Kingston, where he carries a double major. He is enthusiastic about his film industry studies, and is Co-President of the Film Club at Queens. Susannah has carried out many DNS rescues (that is, distressed non-swimmers) over the years, most often involving kids who take off their life-jackets. In emergencies, her extensive training kicks in and she feels comfortable taking charge of any situation.

Susannah recently moved to the High Park area from Mississauga. However, she is still a student at Sheridan College in Oakville, which will make for a long daily commute by public transit come fall. ELIZABETH FREY

Elizabeth is one of our clients in the Adult Day Service (ADS) program. She is energetic and always of a positive mind, wanting to help where she can and use her experience to bring more attention to her "second family" at West Toronto Support Services (WTSS).



Elizabeth Frey, age 25

Born in Germany she witnessed many of the terrors of the Second World War and yearned to hone her passion of photography to help prevent future horrors around the world. Her adventurous spirit started early in life and during this time, she would sneak onto supply planes between Berlin and W. Germany and risk being caught by authorities. Because of the Russian blockade at the time, electricity was scarce and power would only be available for 1 hour a day. She recounts spending late nights in a lab developing her photos.

In 1951, she moved to Canada with her mom, brother, and sister. They had \$30 between them by the time they landed in Toronto. Life couldn't be any worse for her family after witnessing homes being bombed back in her home country. A new chapter in her life began! Only 2 days after her arrival, she managed to secure a job as a Dark Room Assistant at the Monetary Times, a trade magazine publisher. But her success and fame didn't take off until she became a freelance photographer a few months later – a challenging task in itself in a male dominated industry at the time. Her dream job was to work at the Canadian Red Cross as their ideals matched her own. In pursuit of this, she worked at the International Tradeshow and The Globe & Mail and began making a name for herself.

One of her big decisions was an opportunity to go to Cuba. As most photographers didn't want to go at the time, it was an inopportune time to go and show her skills. On her travels there, she met Fidel Castro and although he didn't like his photo taken, she got some great shots. One in particular was published worldwide.

In the 1950's Elizabeth published a book of photos and text called "Toronto – we love you". Inside were photos of the Trudeau Family, including Justin Trudeau who was only a few years old at the time.

Other work she was involved with included Fred Varley from the Group of Seven and some coauthored projects with Dora Pedery-Hunt. One of Elizabeth's favourite photos was taken during her time visiting Vietnam, but was never published, partly because it showed an injured young girl. She not only witnessed the dropping of napalm bombs, but also the affect it had on the victims – especially the children. Elizabeth has always felt it was her duty to help these victims but she never was able to make it back to Vietnam.

After she retired, the National Archives in Ottawa bought 19,000 of her career photos and films. Although she never worked for the Canadian Red Cross, her career was varied and exciting.

Elizabeth attends our ADS program 5 days a week now and her time as a photographer is over. However, she still inspires others and wants to see the ADS program grow. She sees our centre as an important place within the community and has lots of ideas to offer!

She was lucky to find an apartment for sale immediately and, surrounded by "wonderful" neighbours, has felt at home ever since.

Joyce is a Down Easterner, having been born in Cape Breton and raised there and in Prince Edward Island. She remembers making the rounds of parishioners with her father (a minister) and being privileged to sit in the formal parlours of country homes, listening to stories of pioneer ancestors and looking at treasured family photo albums. She credits this period with awakening her lifelong interest in people and in helping others.

The family moved to Ontario, where Joyce completed high school. She then studied nursing and pursued a career as a registered nurse at Ottawa Civic Hospital. She met her future husband, Howard Reynolds, at a boys camp where he was waterfront director and she was the nurse for

the summer. They were married three years later and settled in Montreal, where he started working his way up the corporate ladder in an insurance company. One of Joyce's fondest memories of this stage in her life was accompanying her husband on trips to many interesting locations in North America and the British Isles.

While she enjoyed the time spent raising their two sons (and she now also has "one perfect granddaughter"), Joyce found that she wanted more out of life than being a hostess and corporate wife. So she enrolled in McGill University, majoring in early childhood education. Joyce achieved a further degree in the same discipline from Ryerson when her husband was transferred to Toronto. This was the start of her career in helping other women.

With this background, Joyce has either initiated or worked on numerous programs involving parents and children, especially training and prevention programs such as mother and child dropin centres. A common aim of all her programs was to help mothers with no other outlets except their children gain confidence to expand their lives. Joyce has recruited and trained numerous volunteers over the years, with one of her most satisfying accomplishments being the choice of a particular volunteer to run a program in the Jane/Finch area; the volunteer was so successful that she is now sought after world-wide for her expertise.

Joyce's husband Howard passed away a few years ago, and she is not as active as she once was. However, she remains involved in the church and looks forward to lunch at Tim Hortons with the ladies after Sunday service. She enjoys art classes at Swansea Town Hall and loves teasing her classmates about the next masterpiece. Mall walking has been replaced with aquafit classes, and Joyce says as long as she can drive her car, she'll be going places.

Joyce's main passion these days is the family cottage north of Kingston, fittingly on the same lake where she met her future husband all those years ago. She enjoys paddling about the lake in either her kayak or canoe, or just sitting on the dock waving to passing boaters. Joyce is currently serving a third term on the board of the cottage owners' association, and is heavily involved in efforts to preserve the lake, which is one of the few trout lakes in Ontario.
